## Wrong Plan, Wrong Time, Wrong Reasons

- Less than 9 percent goes to combating COVID-19 through public health spending
- Meanwhile: 27 percent or more than \$500 billion goes to state and local governments
- Meanwhile: 21 percent or approximately \$400 billion goes to policies that reduce private-sector employment
- Meanwhile: 22 percent includes:
  - o \$135 million for the National Endowment for the Arts
  - o \$135 million for the National Endowment for the Humanities
  - o \$200 million for the Institute of Museum and Library Services
  - o \$12 billion for foreign aid
- Excluding stimulus payments to individuals, almost half of the bill will not be spent until 2022 or later approximately 45 percent or \$670 billion
- So, what is spent in 2021?
  - o **Only 5 percent (\$6 billion)** of the \$130 billion for K-12 schools
  - o Only 5 percent (\$250 million) of the \$5 billion for Emergency Housing Vouchers
  - Only 17 percent (\$7 billion) of the \$39 billion for childcare
  - Only 23 percent (\$11 billion) of the \$50 billion for FEMA
  - None of the \$5 billion for Homeless Assistance
- \$1 trillion in previously enacted, unspent stimulus funding remains
- CBO projects the economy to return to pre-pandemic level of real GDP growth by mid-2021, unemployment to steadily decline, and the largest economic growth in more than 15 years
- 229 Republican Amendments offered during 9 Committee markups 2 (0.9%) adopted

## If the Biden Bailout Bill is enacted:

- Almost \$6 trillion = Total COVID-19 stimulus price tag:
  - Over \$17,000 per person; \$69,000 for a family of four
  - More than the GDP of every country other than China and the United States
